


Also your days are long, so you don't need daily regular clothes to change into either... You usually get back eat dinner, shower and go to bed, so again 1-2 sets of standard/lounge wear/clothing is plenty.

Archery hunters you might wear a t-shirt, long sleeve, and a hoodie or jacket in the am, and go down to the long sleeve or t-shirt in the middle of the day, then layer it back on to come out. Usually a light pair of long johns are all that is needed just in case.

Rifle hunters, you will want a pair of light as well as mid-weight long johns, for upper and lower body, so you can adjust as needed. You will most likely want 2-3 layers on

top, plus your jacket for the mornings and evenings. Light gloves are perfect for all day, but might want a little heavier for the am and pm.



Spotting Scope, Binoculars, Range Finder?? There is no need to pack a spotting scope, you do not usually have time to set it up, and it is more weight for you and the horses to carry. If needed, the guides will take one.

Binoculars are the only must have, so you can glass looking for game as needed, a range finder is also ok.

But keep this in mind.... If your guide sees something get ready, don't pull up your binos or range finder to figure it out, your guide will get you oriented. Especially during a rifle hunt, you have a scope, use that, so you are ready to shoot. Many shot opportunities have been lost to fumbling with binos and range finders...

Rain Gear (quiet cloth type) including Leg Gaiters

Boots (Comfortable - already broken in, otherwise be prepared for blisters)
